It's the largest colony in the hemisphere and visitors can get up close and personal by taking a small boat through the salt pond. These pterodactyl-like creatures are not the only reason to visit Antigua's little sister though. The pink sand beaches, fresh lobster dishes, and caves complete with Arawak petroglyphs are a few more. The Barbuda Express ferry departs five days a week from St John's and runs day trips from Jolly Harbour on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

ART GALLERY THAT Creates a scene



Gilly Gobinet's enchanting space stirs the senses and captivates the soul

S et among tropical gardens overlooking a seductive seascape, Gilly Gobinet's working Art Gallery offers scenes as pretty as a picture. And that's before one even begins to browse the delightful paintings on display.

Inside, one wall is devoted to an effervescent collection of paintings in acrylic of tropical flora and fauna such as bougainvillea, hibiscus, pelicans and turtles.

Gilly is one of few artists on the island who specialises in watercolours. These adorn the walls in both figurative and semi-abstract styles.

Barely a square foot of Gilly's gallery in Needs Must Circle, Fitches Creek – a short drive from the international airport – has been excluded from this bacchanalia of colour and canvas. Hand-painted murals adorn exterior walls and even the periphery of the swimming pool.

"Inspiration is never lacking when you're surrounded by all of this," she says brightly, gesturing towards her verdant garden and the ocean beyond.

Anyone wishing to browse Gilly's sundry creations will be treated to a full tour of the property, beginning with the gaily embellished hallway before heading into the bathroom which also houses several pieces. Hundreds more original works in all shapes and sizes, displayed for sale, bedeck the interior rooms, verandah and courtyard. The latter is where Gilly can usually be found at work, brush in hand.

"Most artists are recognisable by one specific style but I am extremely versatile," she says. "I can do anything from cartoons, to delicate pen and ink, to very detailed or loose watercolour and acrylic – practically anything anyone asks me to."

While most of the pieces exhibited are the result of her own impulse, much of Gilly's work is commissioned, particularly her pet portraits for which she donates 10 per cent to local animal charity Dogs and Cats of Antigua. Nearly all her paintings are suitcase-friendly, or can be shipped already stretched or rolled into a tube for convenience. Colourful greetings cards are also available.

British-born Gilly, who has lived in Antigua since 1984, adds: "What I love most is the feeling of achievement when you've created something you love – and you hope others will too."



Nadia Dyson caught up with Kal to find out more.

Why can a client expect from Elmsbridge?

They would first meet with Brian and I, we would tell them a little about our background here, show them around our projects and give the opportunity to review the plots available and the villa designs. We also have pre-selected furnishings that we have chosen especially for their durability in the tropical climate and because they can be easily maintained.

We really help guide clients so they can create peaceful retreats. Quite often they know what they would like at the end but not exactly how to get there to end up with a beautiful furnished home. Because we have been here and been through all of that and are delivering it for clients on a daily basis, we are really a one-stop shop offering a complete service.

Tell us a little about your clients.

Typically, they come from North America or Europe, and increasingly, other parts of the world too. They are often busy so finding all the different elements to put together a home can be a challenge, especially if you have not done it before. It can be fun finding your own team but it can also be stressful and time-consuming.

We are a central point where you can have all of those things done for you. We

oversee everything and are your one point of contact, keeping you updated all the way through. Our clients find it ends up being a really enjoyable process.

Where do you source materials from and how long does the building process generally take?

We work with over 100 different suppliers and many of our materials and partners are sourced locally. For example, our doors and windows for The Gardens are made in Antigua by carpenters who have been in the business for more than 20 years. We use sustainably sourced hardwood from Dominica, working alongside the Forestry Commission there.

After finalising designs, it usually takes about 12 to 14 months to build a 2,500-3,500 square foot home.

ne of few women in the construction industry, La-Dana Ffrench's diligence, efficiency and eye for detail quickly earned her a name as one of Antigua's most respected building contractors.

What's the most interesting project you've worked on?

The most interesting is the one that I am currently working on, The Gardens.

What do you know now that you wish you had known when you started in the industry?

How important it is to be able to adjust quickly to changes. Also, one must have patience and tolerance when dealing with clients and employees alike.

What's a common misconception about building or renovating a home?

This applies to both contractors and homeowners: it looks like "an easy fix" until the works begins and you come across issues that were not foreseen. The renovation or the building then becomes more expensive than what was budgeted for.

Are there any special considerations that should be taken into account when undertaking such a project in Antigua?

There is regularly a shortage of materials on island and this can cause setbacks in terms of the completion timeframe. Also, there is a constant spike in the cost of materials and this can contribute to spending more than what's been budgeted for.

What's the most important piece of advice you would offer a client?

Before purchasing a property that was previously owned, get a certified contractor to do a thorough inspection so you won't be faced with any surprises when you decide to start a renovation.









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

The renovation of Sugar Ridge was something different for us; we normally do new builds. We worked really hard and showed the world what we can do – and it all took off from there.

Who do your clients tend to be and why do they choose Emc^s?

Our typical clients are fairly wealthy and looking for a luxury, finished villa. They pay for managerial services as well and we are able to offer good communication and transparency. We provide monthly reports so they know where they are financially; everything is written line by line.

To most people a house is one of the biggest investments you will make so it's vital to use a company you can trust, and we have a proven track record. Anyone can start a project, but to finish it – to the level a client wants – is the hard part.

'IT STILL TAKES MY BREATH AWAY': Pearns point's adam gobat

Seven years have passed since Adam Gobat first set eyes on the bewitchingly beautiful Pearns Point. "It took my breath away then, and every morning when I arrive at work it still takes my breath away," the development's Sales Director says.

The 137-acre site lays claim to eight white sand beaches, offering buyers a rare opportunity to purchase a generous beachfront plot skirting the Caribbean Sea upon which to create the home of their dreams.

Adam told Nadia Dyson what else sets this eagerly anticipated development apart.

What are the benefits of buying at Pearns Point?

There are a lot of good developments in Antigua and each have their own attributes but being that close to the water is definitely a plus. We have sold some beachfront plots but some remain, and with every plot you only have a short walk to the beach.

It's a previously undeveloped peninsula so you're not looking at any old dilapidated

structures; it really feels new and fresh. And its location allows for a variety of views; some look north, some look south and some look out at the mountains, so it has a bit of everything.

It's also really secure. There is only one road in and one road out, and security staff are there at night.

How soon can a buyer expect to move in after choosing their plot?

Generally within two to three years. We encourage people to start building as quickly as possible. Six months after the title transfer we expect people to have submitted designs to the planning authority. Within a year of receiving final planning approval they should have started construction, and two years after they start building they should have finished. It's a pretty generous timeline; many people want to go faster.

How do you see the future of Pearns Point?

Low-density and high-end. It's a naturally peaceful place and I don't think it will ever be overrun with too many buildings. It is a 10-year project and buyers will have to accept there will be construction on some parts of the property, but it is a very large piece of real estate and noise doesn't usually disturb anyone.

Ultimately, it should be the premium luxury property in the Eastern Caribbean. I don't see anything that's going to rival it.

Any tips for people relocating here?

As someone who also relocated here – albeit from another Caribbean island – I'd say give it a go. They will be moving to a place with fairly impeccable weather, beautiful beaches and beautiful water. It's very friendly, very safe, there are good hospitals, good schools and frequent airlift.

REMARKABLE RENOVATION: HOW ONE Couple transformed a rundown villa Into a stylish waterfront retreat

hen Ladesa and Ian Williams were looking for an investment property, Jolly Harbour ticked all of their boxes. With two young children, maximising their space was a key priority. The pair, who already have a first home in Antigua, took the plunge and embarked on a major refurbishment project to create their dream weekend retreat.

Sam Dyson met with the couple to find out more about the renovation process which saw a total overhaul of Villa 413C.

Why did you choose Jolly Harbour?

Ladesa: We love the beach and wanted to be close to the water. Jolly Harbour has two beaches, plus great restaurants like Al Porto and Curry House, sports facilities, a supermarket, and hiking. We live in Antigua but come here every weekend so it's our weekend home. My daughter loves the beach; we go to North Beach to swim and generally we're the only people there.

Ian: The kids love it here, especially the pool – our son is a competitive swimmer so he uses it a lot – and the fact that they can ride their bikes around.

Tell us about the renovation you undertook.

Ladesa: When we bought the villa it was



in a dire state. We were initially going to keep the floors but, on the advice of the contractor, we decided we may as well go the whole way and do a full refurbishment. We wanted a beachy but modern feel, with an open concept. We have small children so we wanted to maximise the square footage. We converted the garage so that it has four uses: a mud room, pantry, beverage station, and laundry area. We also added a full deck to give more space.

Ian: With any construction work there will be challenges. One of the first hiccups was when the contractor ordered the wrong size glass door; it wasn't tall enough. But for the most part, things went very smoothly.

Ladesa: We were hoping to complete the work in three months. Maybe that was

ambitious; it took five. Much of the delay was waiting for approval to get the dock fitted.

What's your favourite feature of the property?

Ladesa: I really do like the kitchen and laundry area. It took a lot of thought to create it. When you have kids you need space and storage. I like the house to look a certain way so it was important to me to have space to put lunchboxes and shoes away; there's a space for everything.

Ian: I love the deck and patio space – and obviously the gorgeous TV wall I came up with.

How much did you spend in total?

Ladesa: We purchased the villa at the end of 2022 for US\$250,000 and put in an additional US\$125,000 for the renovation, new appliances and soft furnishings. We were able to do a full gut and end up with a property that we love, are proud of and enjoy.

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SANDS OF TIME: THE ANTIGUAN CHILDREN ON A MISSION TO SAVE THEIR ENVIRONMENT

SMALL CARIBBEAN ISLANDS ARE FACING AN EXISTENTIAL CRISIS FROM CLIMATE CHANGE, HERE IN ANTIGUA, YOUNG PEOPLE ARE TAKING MATTERS INTO THEIR OWN HANDS.

n army of pint-sized eco warriors has been taking to beaches islandwide armed with gloves and bags, seedlings and shrubs.

They're young, tenacious and on a crusade to enhance their environment and play their part in battling the climate crisis.

In Antigua and Barbuda, like the rest of the Caribbean, the impacts of changing weather patterns are a daily reality, evidenced in receding beaches, worsening hurricanes, debilitating droughts and increasingly suffocating summers.

One local NGO, however, has enlisted a crew to fight back.

Adopt-a-Coastline has trained more than 60 children as coastal stewards, tasked with planting indigenous trees to slow coastal erosion, protecting the nesting sites of critically endangered turtles, collecting litter, and making and managing beach bins.

The project has been so successful it was selected for a US\$100,000 grant from the United Nations' Global Environment Facility (GEF) last August, one of just 23 ventures chosen from 600 applications.

Ten-year-old Kadeedra Willock, from Five Islands, has been helping remove trash from Deep Bay beach. "I've learned that you should not litter because littering is very bad for the environment," she says.

Terique Spencer, 9, lent a hand planting shrubs. "I've been helping save the trees so we can breathe," he explains.

In recent months, Adopt-a-Coastline's team has planted scores of trees including coconut palms, guinep, almond and neem. Several people took part in a snorkelling workshop aimed at cleaning the shallow sea floor at Turners Beach, while youth steward from Johnson's Point have been learning the value of the circle economy by transforming plastic trash into keyrings, pots and combs for sale.

Kih'Nyiah McKay from Old Road may be just 11 but she's already keenly aware of the unprecedented challenges facing the Caribbean's marine environment. "Young people need to save the Earth," she says with a solemnity that belies her age.

The GEF funding will enable Adopta-Coastline to roll its pioneering work out to three other small Caribbean islands – Antigua's sister Barbuda, plus Nevis and Carriacou – later this year.

A key part of the work is encouraging women and girls to "have more of a voice", explains the NGO's executive director Kat Byles.

Traditional gender roles are still deeply ingrained in much of the Caribbean and the project aims to instil new skills, like collating and analysing eco data, into the





next generation of women and inspire them into taking leadership roles.

Old Road Primary School principal Ryona Shaw-Joseph was delighted to get involved by rounding up a clutch of kids to take part and pitching in with a beach clean-up.

"We need to teach children to take care of what we have so it can be sustained for the future," she says. "And it's important to show the girls a different path," she adds.

Kaiesha Joseph is one who needs little convincing.

At 24, the youth parliamentarian dreams not of working for the government but running it, by one day becoming the country's first female prime minister.

For now though, she has her sights set on taking her younger peers along for the ride by supporting Adopt-a-Coastline's endeavours and mentoring the girls involved.

"We have developed a culture in Antigua and Barbuda where certain roles are for men, and many women still gravitate towards nurturing jobs like midwives, teachers and secretaries," she explains. "They would rather assist from the back and let the men step forward."

Carolyn Perry, from the government's youth affairs department, says while more females are now exploring tertiary education, they still struggle to attain upper management jobs.

"If we empower them from a young age, we will see our communities transformed," she asserts.

Adopt-a-Coastline was founded in 2009 by long-term resident Jennifer Meranto.

"I added up all the trash I'd contributed to Antigua over the last 20 years. People have a misconception that if they throw something away, it goes away. But it doesn't; much of it ends up in the ocean. I decided I wanted to erase my own footprint," she explains.

Jennifer began by removing 1,000 bags of litter from the island's beaches.

Others began to join her and the organisation expanded organically.


For Kat, a crucial aspect of the project is the feeling of wellness that being by the ocean brings.

"The kids say they love being by the water because it makes them feel calm. In addition to learning about corals and turtles, they get the opportunity to be free outdoors, swim in the water and feel alive," she smiles.

She is now looking forward to expanding the work across the region.

"We know that if we fail to act, by 2050 there will be more plastic in the ocean than fish. There are some very depressing statistics that can make you feel hopeless, but by working with the next generation we can do something positive," Kat adds.

"We can rant and rave on Facebook but by taking the time to be by the ocean, become part of nature, listen to nature, plant trees and care for them, we are actually nurturing ourselves too."



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'CARIBBEAN FOOD HAS A RICH And Powerful Story'

CELEBRITY CHEF ANDI OLIVER TALKS RUM, RESTAURANTS AND THE 'Invisible importance' of her antiguan roots

t's a stuffy afternoon in May and Andi Oliver is still catching her breath from the long-anticipated launch of one of her most personal projects to date.

The 'Pepperpot Rum Shop' – a popup experience melding the emblematic Caribbean tipple with some of the celebrated British chef's own dishes – has been 12 months in the making.

"You know when you've pictured something, held it in your heart, and suddenly you're in it and it's a reality?" Oliver enthuses. "Well, today has been one of those days."

If her 2023 debut cookbook 'The Pepperpot Diaries' was a billet-doux to her Antiguan heritage – steeped in the aromas of her childhood and seasoned with anecdotes – then this latest venture goes deeper still.

And it's not just for her love of rum.

"Rum is my favourite drink in the whole world," she says, adding that Antigua's English Harbour Rum is the finest of all.

"The traditional rum shop is an interesting idea to me. I mean, the whole of life is really a rum shop."

Endemic to the region, rum shops have dotted the Caribbean landscape for centuries; tiny informal bars often selling homemade versions of the liquor, abuzz with barbershop banter, raucous games of dominoes and comradeship. "The Pepperpot Rum Shop celebrates Antigua and Barbuda through food in a simple way and with a pan-Caribbean lexicon; it celebrates our history, our now, our present, while looking to the future," she explains.

"Rum is my favourite drink in the whole world," she says, adding that Antigua's English Harbour Rum is the finest of all.

Oliver is in Antigua for the second instalment of Restaurant Week – a two-week gastronomic extravaganza organised by the Tourism Authority (ABTA), offering fixed price menus and special dining experiences nationwide. This year, 65 eateries ranging from roadside 'cookshops' to high-end resorts signed up.

The Pepperpot Rum Shop is a collaboration between Oliver, the ABTA and host venue, the Treehouse Beach Club, one of the island's hottest new spots found hugging the Fort James coastline. Over 100 days all the way through to July, foodies can tuck into some of Oliver's most beloved dishes, like chocolate curried goat, while enjoying music, art and the beachfront hangout's experiential vibe.

At the time we chat, Oliver has only been

here a day and a half and she's hit the ground running with the unbridled enthusiasm that saw her quickly endear herself to UK television audiences as a judge and now presenter on the Great British Menu.

Her signature gap-toothed grin and rapid-fire speech are both in full force as she relates the breakneck pace of her trip to date – and the weather. (She may be of Antiguan parentage but she's a Brit after all.) The weather, frankly, has been "bananas" – fluctuating between torrential rain and blistering sun in true Caribbean fashion.

"We've been celebrating one year since the launch of my book which celebrates Antigua and Barbuda heritage and culture through the prism of food. It's a recipe book but it's also about my family life, my thoughts, my dreams, my desires. It's done really well," she adds. It's a modest understatement. Rave reviews routinely use words like "fascinating", "remarkable" and "divine".

Restaurant Week is important, Oliver thinks, as it honours what is still something of a niche in the international food index.

"Too often food served in the Caribbean is from elsewhere. It's great to cook food from all over the world, and it's good to be connected in that way, but sometimes we need to showcase our own too," she imparts.

"Caribbean food has a rich and powerful story. It's incredibly diverse with influences

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from Portugal, Italy, China, Spain. Restaurant Week really commemorates that; it jazzes the history up and celebrates the here and now."

Growing up in the Suffolk countryside with Antiguan parents, one of few families of colour in those days, Oliver's Caribbean roots were "invisibly important" throughout her childhood.

"It was part of the thread of my life, the way we approached life, the way we approached education, the way we approached excellence. Our ideas of the world were all really based in the Caribbean; it was just the way we were," she recalls.

"I didn't really realise how powerful that heritage was until I got older and started to realise how Caribbean we were."

Pressed for an example, she laughs.

"My parents were very strict for a start – and we were always polite to our elders.

"My mum was very liberal," she continues. "She always taught me to follow my heart and be brave. If you come from a migrant family who have travelled thousands of miles to make a new life for themselves, that spirit and courage is inherent in how you approach life.

"I inherited my mother's spirit of adventure; she was a very powerful woman."

Fun fact: Oliver, mother of TV personality Miquita Oliver, is closely related to another Antiguan-rooted clan of high acclaim in Britain – the Kanneh-Mason musical siblings.

"Their father Stuart is my first cousin," she explains. "I'm very proud of my family and the way we strive for excellence."


Oliver's parents both grew up in Antigua – her father was born in Piggots and raised in Point – but the family rarely visited the island when she was a child. Travel back then was expensive and flights limited.

Her first visit to her ancestral home was "mind blowing".

"I was 16. It was extraordinary for me; I'd never been anywhere where Black people were the majority.

"I was the only Black girl in my school most of the time," she says. "It was awful, it was the 70s, I got really bullied and called names. But it made me even more determined to do great things. I vowed not to spend the rest of my life being belittled by people who were quite ignorant and not very bright.

"I wasn't used to being embedded in Black culture outside of my family. So when I came to Antigua I loved it. I was only supposed to



stay for six weeks but I ended up staying six months."

Oliver's love of cooking dates all the way back to when she was a little girl.

"My dad loved to have a party. He wasn't a great dad but he threw a good party," she smiles. "He would invite everyone over, there would be five pots bubbling on the stove, a barbecue on the go, the house filled with music.

"I have cooked since I was a little kid with my mum or dad. Today it's my meditation, my artistry, the way I show love to people, the way I communicate with them, and my way of creating environments that I want to be in."

These days, the shindigs of her youth are recreated in her kitchen with a soundtrack as diverse as her dishes.

"I always listen to music while I'm cooking - all different kinds of music. People often ask what kind of music I like and I say 'good music'. The same as my food – I just like good food.


"I might listen to Aretha Franklin or Sam Cook, and newer stuff too like Alabama Shakes, and SALT."

Oliver describes her culinary style as the "food of love".

"For me, food is an offering. I love to cook with alcohol, for example, curing fish in mescal or gin with berries or gold rum."

A favourite dish she's willing to share is salmon cured with summer berries, English Harbour Rum, salt and sugar. She recommends wrapping it in cling film and putting it in the fridge for 24 to 48 hours, turning it every eight hours. It should then be rinsed off and cut very thin. It's like a gravlax, she says, and utterly delicious served with mayo and warm Caribbean coco bread.

Some of her go-to flavours include molasses and dark rich spices like cinnamon and nutmeg, plus celery leaves and wild herbs





such as Antiguan bay leaf.

One-quarter of the way into the 21st century, once esoteric cuisines like Korean, Vietnamese and Lebanese are firmly established in cities the world over. Caribbean food, less so.

"Misconceptions about Caribbean food are only just starting to shift. Changing that is a passion of mine - making people understand it's not just jerk chicken," Oliver says.

"The culinary world is opening up generally. We just saw the UK's first female Black Michelin-starred chef [London-based Nigerian Adejoké Bakare], but we still need to push more and educate more.

"That's another reason why Restaurant Week and the Pepperpot Rum Shop are important."

Asked for her top tip to any aspiring chef, Oliver is unequivocal.

"Work hard – and know your s**t. Don't put things on the plate because they look pretty; put them there because there's a reason for the palate. Never include anything that doesn't enhance the flavour," she says.

With her big personality and propensity for breaking into a belly laugh, fans might be surprised to discover Oliver is at heart somewhat diffident.

"I'm quite shy, weirdly shy in fact. One on one, I get nervous."

Something else people might be intrigued to know about her is that she has a fondness for dodgy TV.

"I watch a lot of really, really bad telly. I've watched literally every Real Housewives," she confesses. "It's like TV crack. I'm like, why am I watching this, it's awful. And then I watch another."

Four decades since she first found her feet on the celebrity stage – not as a chef but as a singer with post-punk band Rip Rig + Panic – Oliver says the most important lesson she's learned along the way is a simple one: "Just be kind."

It's an ethos she has carried with her throughout her multi-faceted career.

"I'm proud of all of my accomplishments," she says, adding: "Every step has taken me to the next rung on life's evolutionary ladder – singer, writer, cook, chef, broadcaster – and each one has opened up new and interesting doors."

You were born and raised in Nicaragua. What was your childhood like?

It was a very nurturing environment and lots of fun. Following the tradition of most Latin families, I had a big one - we were five kids and lots of cousins. Every family reunion was a big party. Every week we were celebrating a birthday. I grew up thinking that life was a party.

Before entering the hospitality industry, you spent four years working for the diplomatic corps serving the governments of South Korea and Venezuela. How did the skills you learnt then translate into your incredible career today?

Working with the diplomatic corps in Miami exposed me to many different cultures, languages and idiosyncrasies. Finding a common purpose to unite is key to happy coexistence. At Nikki Beach, we found this purpose and it is to celebrate life through music, food, friends, and family with tolerance and respect. At any given time at Nikki Beach, you will find people from all over the world enjoying the moment and creating fabulous experiences together.

How did your career evolve?

Let me start by giving some background on my husband, Jack Penrod, and how we met and began working together. Jack's beginnings were humble, working his way up from a line cook at McDonald's earning \$.85 an hour as a teenager to becoming one of the largest franchise owners within the corporation.

'GOOD FOOD DOESN'T HAVE TO Be expensive'

ACCLAIMED ANTIGUAN CHEF AND GREAT BRITISH MENU CONTESTANT Kareem Roberts Tells us his favourite foods, top tips and why he favours cheap ingredients

t may have been "sheer patriotism" that brought Kareem Roberts back home to Antigua for Restaurant Week, but his passion for Caribbean cuisine is something rather more ethereal.

"It speaks to my soul," he says, during an interview snatched between the food panel discussions and tasting menus he's been participating in as part of this year's gastronomic extravaganza.

It's all in the seasoning, he explains.

"We season food immaculately. Sometimes we overseason, but it's better than underseasoning. Overseasoning I can live with," he adds.

At 43, Roberts – who Brits will recognise from hit BBC television show, the Great British Menu - has an intensity about him. Responses are often concluded with a resolute "yes, yes" – an addendum to emulate a point.

Just as his culinary creations are known for their visual appeal, when speaking he paints pictures with words: eloquent, carefully considered and articulate.

There's a humility there too. And not just for his propensity for prioritising cheaper ingredients in the kitchen.

In lieu of formal fine dining training, much of what he's learned along the way was gleaned on the job, from benevolent older chefs who took him under their wing, from YouTube, from books, from eating out.

Sidebar: He's also the son of legendary Antiguan cricketer Andy Roberts. There's a reason why you didn't see that mentioned in the promo material for Restaurant Week or the Great British Menu - it was at his request. He'd rather let his food speak for itself.

This year was his first time taking part in



Restaurant Week, an experience he describes as "spellbinding".

"It's been so charming and I appreciate the initiative; it has great potential," Roberts says, "not just for locals but for incoming tourists, consumers and producers.

"I had to take part; I couldn't let an opportunity like this pass me by."

Born in Leicester, England, to an Antiguan father and Jamaican mother, and raised in Antigua from just a few months old, the piquant flavours of the Caribbean are firmly entrenched in his food. Here is where he cut his teeth – most notably at the former Café Napoleon in Redcliffe Quay and the Sandals resort – before moving back to the UK at the age of 26 "to get some international exposure".

"It was a culture shock because I had never lived anywhere quite like that," he recalls. "But I had no problem assimilating because the universal language of the kitchen is 'get the job done'."

While he learned how to taste in the Caribbean, he says the UK was where he learned how to cook.

"Something the UK showed me that I didn't learn anywhere else was precision. There's a difference and it's consistency, understanding the best way the ingredients should be consumed. We tend to overcook things in the Caribbean," he explains.

"In the UK, and in acclaimed restaurants everywhere, you find precision and consistency go before anything other than the quality of the ingredients."

Trips home to Antigua serve as a frequent reminder of the quality of fresh produce grown in backyards and in small farms nationwide.

"It's second to none. The root vegetables are incredible," Roberts smiles.

His favourite local ingredients include cassava, green banana and deepwater fish like blue marlin, swordfish and tuna. His go-to Caribbean flavours are allspice, thyme, scallion, garlic, ginger and coconut milk.

Almost two decades since taking what began as a hobby into a career, Roberts has honed his skills in some of the world's most esteemed kitchens, including as head chef at Cambridge-based fine dining restaurant Trinity. But it was while competing against the UK's leading chefs on last year's Great British Menu that he carved his path to fame.

The fish dish he served – loin of cord in a green yoghurt made of spinach and seaweed, roasted and served with Messiah mushrooms – may not have propelled him to the next round but judges lauded the texture and taste.

While Roberts' food has often been said



to have Indian, West Indian and French influences, he's careful not to delineate it too much.

"My style is very personal; that's the best way I can describe it. It's an extension of everything I have done, everything I've tasted, every conversation I have had about food," he says.

"I am not a devout practitioner of any tradition. I am constantly in pursuit of evolution and change, and also restraining what I do, perpetually trying to become more efficient."

One thing he's unequivocal about is what he views as the hollowness of favouring expensive ingredients, a notion encapsulated in his Instagram handle @brokedinner.

"I tend to elevate cheaper cuts of meat and cheaper ingredients. I haven't put a steak on a menu in ages; it's not my thing," he says.

"To hit profit margins, I prefer not to have to count my inventory so judiciously. I'd rather serve something where the bulk of its cost comes from labour. I'd rather put the time and effort into elevating a cheap ingredient than buy something that's 40 quid a kilo and just stir it gently."

The Antigua and Barbuda Tourism Authority's efforts to put the country on the international food map through endeavours like Restaurant Week are slowly reaping dividends, although there's still some way to go, Roberts thinks.

A prevailing misconception about Caribbean food is that "everything is spicy".

"But everything is not. I don't think people understand it yet because they haven't had the exposure," he continues.

The rise of food-based social media pages has helped broaden palates to some extent.

"Everyone follows these world travellers and wanderlust has helped people travel from the comfort of their armchair and the screen of their phone," he says. "But what's missing is the connection of actual sensory perception. You are only engaged with the sight and the sound. You miss the cacophony of aroma and texture, as well as the actual consumption part.

Almost two decades since taking what began as a hobby into a career, Roberts has honed his skills in some of the world's most esteemed kitchens, including as head chef at Cambridge-based fine dining restaurant Trinity.

"So while I think people are being exposed to seeing these exotic foods, these ingredients and chefs that excite them, there's nothing like that 3D experience."

Local dishes like goat water, conch water and roasted corn – seen being cooked up on roadsides the island over – remain as much a part of Roberts' culinary lexicon today as when he was a child growing up in Urlings and Marble Hill.

"I think street food anywhere is amazing," he enthuses. "I love our grilled chicken, the soups – I adore them, I cherish them, I can't consume enough of them." Asked for the secret to devising a dish that's both visually stunning and innovatively flavourful, there's one component he rates above all others: the humble tomato.

"There's something about red that's appetising. When you think about most fast food joints, there's always red in the branding. People associate red with hunger," he explains.

"Tomatoes are also indicative of what I like to do. When you think about the most versatile ingredient on Earth, a tomato has to be way up there; it's a fruit, it's a vegetable, you can eat it cooked or raw, there are multiple varieties, it's beautiful, it marinades well, it pairs perfectly with garlic or sugar, it can become a soup or a sauce. It does everything."

Roberts even makes his own tomato oil which forms the basis of various condiments from salad dressings to mayonnaises.

He has one final piece of advice for fellow foodies.

Brining – soaking food in a salt water solution – he says has been a "game changer" for him.

"If you want to be a chef and you want to aim and achieve consistency, don't turn a blind eye to brining your food.

"Salt is messy. If I'm cooking a piece of chicken or fish, I have to season it or teach the chef how to season it properly and it's prone to error. Sometimes you use too much salt, sometimes not enough. I'd rather remove the possibility for error."

Whether it's the surge in popularity of TV cook shows, heightened awareness of culinary ethics, or a lean towards healthier options, the food industry has undeniably undergone momentous change in recent years.

Too many restaurants place greater emphasis on the consumer rather than the chef, Roberts feels.

"They bend over backwards to the consumer. I get it, it's a consumer-led industry, but I do believe that for a chef to truly break the mould of what we can do and for us to evolve the concept of dining, the customer has to be a second thought and the chef has to be allowed to just cook," he adds emphatically.

"If more people were willing to support a chef that just cooks what he wants, we would have much more diverse food offerings. And they'd probably be cheaper too."

'I'm living my childhood dream'

Beauty pageants are as much a part of Caribbean carnival festivities as soca, sequins and sunshine. But, unlike many of their international counterparts, they're no longer skin deep. Today's carnival queens are bold, bright and bent on making a difference.

Ischikelle Corbin's communication skills, confidence and determination to combat stigma around mental health has earned her a fistful of crowns across the region over the last 12 months.

As Antigua's reigning queen, she has also used her platform to help boost local youngsters' selfesteem, while supporting single mothers and soup kitchens, and helping raise awareness of HIV.

Here, the 27-year-old from Parham, who works as a villa rentals coordinator at exclusive Jumby Bay, tells Luxury Locations Magazine about her whirlwind year.

How has the last year been for you?

It's been unbelievable, transformative, and rewarding. I am living out one of my childhood dreams of being Miss Antigua and Barbuda, but I have gone a step further securing three titles in only nine months.

I've dedicated myself to service and personal development in my community, focusing on mental health and wellness initiatives.

What's been the highlight? Any low points?

Connecting with so many people. In February, I hosted my 'Queens Camp' initiative – a workshop that focused on empowering young individuals by boosting their confidence through mindsetshifting activities. The turnout was unbelievable, showing the impact and influence of my platform. Participants were inspired to become their best selves and to compete in local pageants.

A low point has been experiencing these beautiful moments without my mother who I lost to cancer in 2019, but her legacy continues to inspire and guide me.

How did you get into pageantry?

I started in 2008 when I entered the Optimist Petit competition, inspired by my mother, who was a community activist and pageant enthusiast. I have always had a love for performing and would often host my own shows in the living room, creating a microphone out of any object I could find and making any space my own runway.

I would see the queens on television, such as Queen of Carnival and Miss Universe, and I wanted to be like them. I would tell anyone who would listen that I would be Queen of Carnival and Miss Universe and, so far, one of those has come true. My mother, having noticed my passion and abilities, encouraged me to take part in activities that further led me to this path, and I am forever grateful.

How does it feel to be on stage?

Being on stage feels like home to me. It's a blend of excitement and nerves, but it's where I feel most comfortable. I love sharing my passion for the arts and connecting with the audience.

Do you have a mantra you say to yourself before a show?

I practice positive self-talk always. Even while I'm on stage, I continue repeating empowering things to myself. I also say a little prayer asking God and my mom to hold my hand and walk with me through every segment.

Do you ever get nervous?

Yes, of course, but I've learned to redirect my thoughts towards positive outcomes. I take my preparation very seriously because when you prepare and practice rigorously, you are able to feel more confident about your performance, leaving nothing to chance.

Focusing on enjoying the moment and giving my best helps calm my nerves. I believe that in life we either win or we learn, and this mindset helps take the pressure of winning off my shoulders allowing me to further live in the moment and truly enjoy being on stage.

How do you see the future of pageantry?

I have seen so many changes within the pageant industry that have been commendable. There are many restrictions that have been lifted such as age limits, marital status or being a mother. I would love to see this inclusivity within our small island developing states, allowing more women to take part in pageants without limitations.

I hope to see pageantry continue to emphasise beauty with a purpose, including provisions for service and more support for queens. This would definitely allow our young women to develop and build the experience and character required to be strong contenders for international pageants like Miss World and Miss Universe.

Any top tips for other young girls looking to follow in your footsteps?

"Change your thinking, change your life." This mantra helps me focus and channel positive energy needed for success. I would advise you to be clear about the vision and what you want. Embrace self-love, align your actions with your goals, see failure as a learning opportunity, practice gratitude, and trust the process. Always believe in yourself and your abilities because if you believe you can, then you will. But if you believe you can't, then you won't.

What makes you proud to be Antiguan?

Our rich culture, vibrant community, and the spirit of resilience and compassion. Antigua and Barbuda's unique heritage and the warmth of its people make me incredibly proud.

What do you do when you're not working?

I'm currently pursuing studies in psychology at the University of the West Indies, so I spend quite a lot of my free time studying. When I'm not working or studying, I spend time with family, create content, watch movies, read books at the beach, and fulfil my duties as queen by engaging in my community.

Best advice you've ever been given?

"Change your thinking, change your life."This advice has helped me realise the power of positive thinking and its impact on overcoming challenges.

Favourite food? Song? Movie?

My favourite food is tabbouleh, a refreshing and filling salad. My favourite song is 'Unstoppable' by Sia, and my favourite movie is 'Me Before You'.

Pet peeves?

Negativity and a lack of respect for others. I believe in fostering a positive and respectful environment.

Most important lesson you've learned?

The importance of self-love and positive self-talk. Building confidence and self-belief are crucial for success and resilience.

Tell us something people don't know about you.

I love learning languages. I spent some time living in Russia, where I learned to speak Russian. It was an amazing and enriching experience.


What superpower would you choose and why?
